BODY OF BURRELL IS FOUND BY BROTHER

Brevard Physicians Say Man Was Dead Before He Fell Into Water Pool

The body of Lonnie Burrell, rethe Tuckaseegee river last Sunday had no life in it when it went into the water, according to opinion of Dr. G. B. Lynch and Dr. E. S. The body was found Sunday afternoon in 15 feet of water by a brother of the deceased, with the dead man's walking stick lying near the edge of the water. A coroner's jury attri-buted the man's death to accidentally falling into the water.
