

### Many Chevrolets

CHICAGO, July 3—First month's production of Chevrolet cars at the Chicago World's Fair General Motors building assembly line totaled 468 units, according to information released by Dudley Fraser, assembly line manager.

By actual count 646,107 people have visited the exhibit to watch the building of Chevrolet cars, an increase over the first 30 days last year.

Retail sales of Chevrolet cars in the General Motors building are materially higher than last year also, it was reported.

The Chevrolet World's Fair assembly line employs 175 workmen selected by merit from Janesville, Kansas City, Norwood and Flint assembly plants. They work six hours a day six days a week, according to the NRA automotive code.

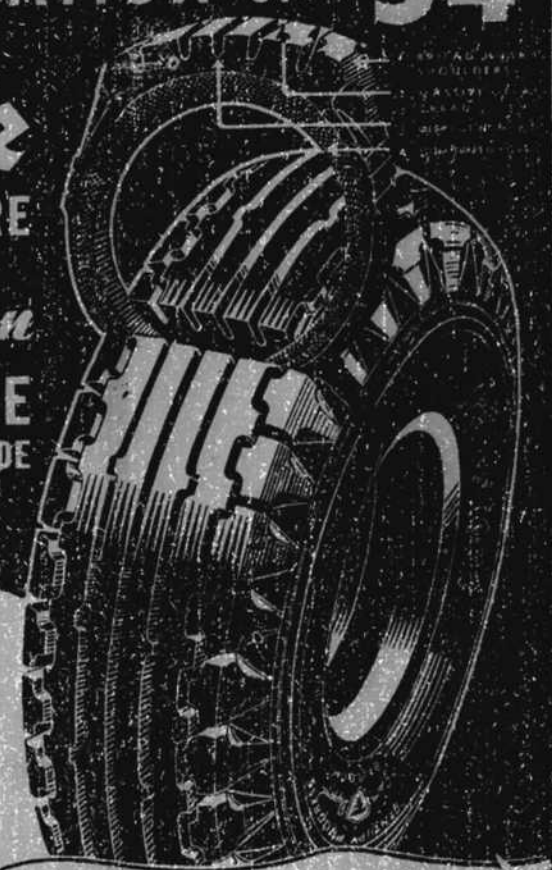
