Vienna—A decree published here gave opponents of Chancellor Engelbert Dollfuss five days in which to give all explosives to the government. Anyone caught with explosives after the expiration of that period faces a single penalty—death. Courts will not be permitted to impose milder sentences.

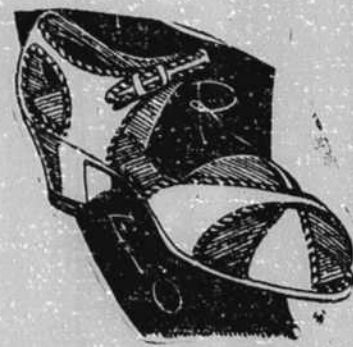

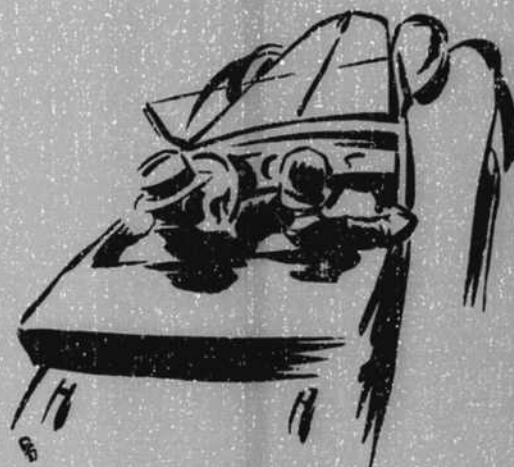
