

Brevard Dahlia Show Far Better Than Previous Year

HUNDREDS ATTEND EXHIBIT SATURDAY

Out Of Town People Have Entered—Prize Winners Announced

Great success was accorded Brevard's second annual dahlia show, held Saturday afternoon and evening in the Harris building on West Main street. The show was sponsored by the Transylvania Dahlia club. The judges, R. R. Robinson, of Asheville, and J. Z. Cleveland, of Zirconia, were high in their praise of the show and were of the opinion that it was a credit to Brevard and to the dahlia growers of this section. Hundreds of varieties of dahlias were on exhibition, all blending harmoniously in their colors, ranging from gorgeous deep shades, to those of more delicate hue, in most pleasing effect. Both the quality of the flowers and the show in its entirety were pronounced by the judges and others competent to judge as surpassing the first dahlia show held last summer. Mr. Cleveland assisted in judging Sections B and C only, since he entered exhibits in Section A, which was open to all exhibitors. Three double tiers of 4 by 10 space were used by Mr. Cleveland to display his unusual array of dahlias in many varieties, sizes and colors. It was generally felt that his exhibit added greatly to the success of the show. Much interest was manifested in this feature on the part of the numerous visitors attending during the afternoon and evening. Other out of town exhibitors included H. T. Mills of Greenville, S. C., and C. C. Hutches, of Bradenton, Fla., and Rosman, his summer residence. These two exhibitors added much also to the show with their beautiful specimens of dahlias of varied types. Twenty different exhibitors, including local and outside people, entered dahlias in the 34

classes making up the three sections of exhibits. Much credit for the outstanding success of the event is due Mrs. Marcus Williams, chairman of the dahlia show, and Mrs. John Maxwell, president of the dahlia club, for their untiring and efficient efforts, together with their able assistants. Officials of the Dahlia club wish to express their appreciation to all those who helped in any way to make a success of the show.
