

BREVARD COLLEGE ELEVEN IN TIE GAME

Scrapping Line For Locals Is Outstanding Feature Of Game Played Here

Brevard College's fighting football team met the heavier Appalachian Freshmen from Boone Saturday on the college field in a game that was bitterly contested all the way and came off the field with the score tied at six all. The Freshmen, with a starting lineup that averaged 192 pounds, were able to push their much lighter opponents around over the field through the first half of the game but the scrapping Brevard line outplayed the Freshman forward wall to such an extent the last half that the game should be rated a standoff from point of play.

First quarter of the game was consumed with the local eleven in possession of the ball the greater part of the time. Brevard was not able to get outside their own end of the field.

Second quarter opened with Appalachian kicking to Brevard on the Brevard twelve yard line. Shuford immediately kicked back to Appalachian's 48. The return kick was brought back to Brevard's 45. The entire visiting backfield took turns in jugging the leather through the Brevard line until the first sustained drive of the game bogged down on the four yard line. Shuford, standing inside the end zone, kicked to Brevard's forty yard stripe. A penalty set him back to the extreme end of the end zone and he kicked out again. The ball was down on Brevard's thirty-eight yard line.

Ground plays, with Holt, substitute for Stere for Appalachian, doing the most of the ground gaining, carried to the twelve yard line. After the Brevard defense stiffened Appalachian elected to pass. The first toss found a waiting defender in the Brevard Blue. The half ended with the locals in possession of the ball on their own fifteen yard line.

Entire complexion of the game was changed with kickoff in the second half. The Brevard linemen began nout-charging the huge Appalachian out-charging the huge Appalachian forwards. Opening kickoff was brought back to their thirty yard line by the Blue. Shuford punted to Appalachian's 40. The return kick found the Blue twenty and they asked again. Appalachian kicked to Brevard's 30. This set the stage for Shuford's long kick. In spite of the fact that the Appalachian safety was playing deep in wait for the kick, Shuford sailed one high over his head and rolled it over the goal line, getting 63 yards after one ground play had netted a small gain.

In possession of the ball on the twenty, the Freshmen began the longest sustained drive of the afternoon, losing the ball to the fighting Blue on Brevard's eight-yard line. A bad kick gave the Freshmen the ball again on the thirty. A twelve yard toss through the air opened up the scrapping linemen and Holt went over from the two yard line. Kick for the punt failed. Third quarter began after a few ground plays had been run, placing Brevard in possession of the ball on their own 35.

An aerial, Prentice to Shuford, with Shuford waiting just beyond the line of scrimmage, crossed up the defense and gained eleven yards. Appalachian, certain that a wild passing game was about to begin, spread their defense. This situation found Shuford going across his own right tackle, cutting sharp to the left, wiggling through a maze of defensive players, and crossing the Appalachian goal on the opposite side of the field from where the run started. Prentice failed on a plunge for the extra point.

Having denied pay-dirt, the Blues escorted Walter Clayton to the twelve yard line on returning kick. A shoe-string tackle that was a slip-tackle at that threw Clayton into the arms of the final defending Freshman. Ground plays failed on the four yard line. A bad Appalachian kick again placed Brevard College in scoring position but the game ended before score could be made.

Stars for Appalachian included the entire team. Only two substitutions were made by the Appalachian coach, Holt for Stere and Holt for Stere. Coach Ralph James made liberal use of the rule which allows a player to go in every quarter. This rule undoubtedly had much to do with the excellent showing put up by the light blue-clad warriors. Kilpatrick, Proffitt and Shuford stood out for Brevard.
