BROAD STREET JOB IS VERY UNSUITABLE

Town Board Seeks To Secure Better Paving—Work Already Started

Work was begun Monday morning on North Broad street by the R B. Tyler company, plans being to straighten and broaden the street from the square to the city limits across Kings Creek. Labor for the project is being furnished by the local re-employment office.

Plans call for laying six feet of crushed stone and bituminous surface treatment on six feet alongside the pavement now in use, making street 30 feet wide. the

Effort has been made by the Town of Brevard officials to have the highway department rebuild the enhighway department rebuild the entire street for a distance of approximately 2,500 feet instead of the side work for 3,900 feet, but the highway department states that the work is being done with federal funds, and as the original plans submitted by the state to the bureau of federal roads called for the six foot stretch on each side of the present pavement, it cannot be changed.

Widows and children have preference over dependent parents. If there is no widow or child, dependent mother may file, or if mother is not entitled, dependent father may file. Dependency of parents is presumed after age 60, and before that age evidence of dependency must be presented.

VIOLATION OF LAV TO INJURE SHRUBS

"Consolidated Statutes Section 4301 (a). Injury to trees, woods crops, etc., near highway: depositing trash near highway.— Any person not being on his own lands, or with out the consent of the owner thereof who shall, within one hundred yard of any State highways of North Carolina or within a like distance of any other public road or highway willfully commit any damage, injury or spoliation to or upon any tree wood, underwood, timber, garden or o ps, vegetables, plants, lands springs, or any other matter or thing growing or being thereon, or who cuts, breaks, injures, or removes any tree, plant, or flower within such limits, or shall deposit any trash debris, garbage or litter within such limits, shall be guilty of a misde meanor and upon conviction fine not exceeding fifty dolairs (\$80.00) or imprisoned not exceeding thirty days: Provided, however, that this act shall not apply to the different agents, and employes of the State Highway Commission or county road authorities while in the discharge of their duties."
