AUTO TAGS MUST BE ON CARS JAN. FIRST

Over half the automobile owners in Transylvania county are still without 1935 tags, and this in face of the positive statement issued Thursday by L. S. Harris, director of the state motor vehicle bureau to the effect that auto owners will be subject to prosecution unless they have their 1935 tags on their vehicles by midnight, December 31.

Harris stated that applying for the tag does not mean that an automobile owner has complied with the law. They must have the plates on their cars by January 1. Every violation, the director said, will be prosecuted and fines of from \$10 to \$50 or jail sentences may be imposed.
