COUNTY TAX RATE SET AT \$1.55 ON **HUNDRED DOLLARS**

Debt Service Requirements Larger Than All Other **Items** Appropriated

County tax rate for the year 1935-36 will remain at \$1.55 on the one hundred dollar valuation, according to action taken by the bound of county commissioners in meeting * here Monday.

The following appropriations for the year were authorized by the commissioners, with debt service or items labeled bond interest and commission being over half the entire levy, this item calling for \$86,757.50. Other items are:
