Land from which crops were har-vested totaled 14,013 acres in 1934, or an average of about 13 acres per farm. Report Violation of State Highway Rules

Several school bus drivers have recently reparted that auto and truck drivers are not obeying the law in regard to stopping while school buses are loading and unload-ing children. Attention of the public is called to the following pertaining to passing buses on the highway:

"No person operating any motor vehicle on the public roads shall pass or attempt to pass, any public school bus, while the same is standing on the said public road taking on or putting off school children, without first bringing said motor vehicle to a full stop at a distance of not less than fifty feet from said school

"Any person violating the provis-ions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not to exceed fifty dollars or imprisoned not to exceed thirty days."
