Brevard College In Musical Presentation

"Lolawala, or the Maid of Niagara," a three-act dramatic operetta, was ably presented by the glee clubs of Brevard College Monday and Tuesday evenings of last week in the Brevard high school auditorium. Miss Charlotte Hatcher, voice instructor at the college, was director of the play.

The stage setting and decorations were appropriate to the Indian theme of the operetta and added much to the enjoyment and interest of the performance. The costumes also lent color to the effective scene. The orchestra, under the direction of Professor D. S. Trammell, head of the music department, was an important feature of the production.

Miss Ruth Sylvester starred in the title role, with Marshall Houts portraying the Indian chief. They were ably supported by a large cast of characters, featuring choruses of Indian hunters, soldiers and maidens. This first operetta ever given at Brevard College was generally pronounced a highly successful performance, reflecting credit on the director and those taking part.

Business Census To Be Started January 2

T. Galloway Williamson of Asheville, who has been named supervisor of the business census for the eleventh congressional district, announces that enumeration will start in the 13 Western North Carolina counties on January 2. District offices will be located in Asheville.

Mr. Williamson said the assistant supervisor and office staff will be appointed soon and the 36 enumerators will be named the latter part of December. All census employees are bound by a strict census oath not to reveal any information obtained on business reports and the law makes any violation a criminal offense.

The 36 enumerators will be distributed among the counties of this district as follows: Buncombe 13, Cherokee 2, Clay 1, Graham 1, Haywood 3, Henderson 4, Jackson 1, McDowell 2, Macon 1, Polk 1, Rutherford 5, Swain 1 and Transylvania 1.
