

CONNESTEE FALLS OPEN NEXT SUMMER

Arrangements Made Whereby Tourists May Visit the Scene Without Fee

Connestee Falls, one of the most frequented scenic spots in Western North Carolina, will again be open to the public next year, with no entrance fee charges.

Arrangements are being made by the Brevard Kiwanis club to do repairs on the guard railings that lead to the foot of the falls, and also to provide with safety guard rails at the top of the falls.

The property is in the hands of the trust department of the Wachovia Bank & Trust company of Asheville, N. C., and C. N. Walker, trust officer, has kindly consented to leave the property open provided supervision is provided by the Kiwanis club, and further, that precautions are taken to preclude accidents there.

Thousands of visitors have visited the falls during the past two years that there have been no charges made for viewing the high cataract, and the Brevard Kiwanis club at its meeting last Thursday expressed appreciation to the Wachovia Bank for generosity in assisting the community in offering the added attraction to visitors without charges.

Expense of providing safety facilities at the falls will be borne by the Kiwanis club, and supervision will also be through the club.

WPA WORKERS WILL GET CHECKS MONDAY

Over Two Hundred Will Receive Pay In Time For Christmas

All WPA workers in the county will be paid Monday, Dec. 23, according to announcement by W. E. Breese, district director.

Special messenger was sent to Raleigh from the Asheville office of WPA Saturday, and will return Monday with checks for the workers, Mr. Breese said, in order that the employees of the WPA may have their pay for Christmas.

Checks were distributed here this week to women workers in the sewing rooms, the checks being for two weeks' work.

With over two hundred people drawing pay from the Works Progress Administration at this time, Christmas in the county will be much happier for as many families, some of whom have had no assistance for the past six or more weeks.

All workers in the eighth district were given increase of ten per cent in pay effective Wednesday, Dec. 18, the order affecting nearly eight thousand people.

Workers will be given a two and one-half day holiday for Christmas, with pay, the holiday starting Tuesday at noon and ending Friday morning.

Firecracker Shots On Decrease Here

With announcement in The Transylvania Times of last Thursday to the effect that police would arrest any persons shooting firecrackers in the uptown section of Brevard, or caught selling fireworks, the practice of shooting firecrackers stopped by at least 98 per cent.

Several complaints had been turned in to the mayor and the policemen by citizens who had been frightened or burned by fireworks, and the order was made last Monday night by Mayor Harris that the ordinance already on the books of the town be strictly enforced.

Warns Against Abuse Of City Mail Boxes

Mail boxes in Brevard are for depositing mail only, and to put any foreign substance or articles other than mail in the boxes placed at various places in the town is a violation of the federal postal laws, and violators are subject to severe fine and penalty.

Gerald Sitton, city mail carrier, reports that frequently he finds various kinds of objects in the city collection boxes, and he issues the warning that children, and grownups too, for that matter, stop the practice.

Special Session of Legislature Needed

CHARLOTTE, Dec. 21—Lieutenant Governor A. H. Graham in an address here last night called upon Governor Ehringhaus "in the early months of the new year" to call a special session of the General Assembly to enact social security legislation, set up a state alcoholic control authority and repeal the sales tax upon essential foods.

"It is my mature opinion that the Governor should call a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of enacting security legislation which will meet the federal requirements and thus save for our working people of North Carolina almost two million dollars that will be paid by the state into the federal treasury during the coming year," declared Mr. Graham, known throughout the state as "Sandy," who is making a strong bid for the democratic nomination for governor in next June's primary.
