#### Forest Fires During Week Do Big Damage To County Woodland

Porest fires have done considerable damone in nearly all sections of the county during the past ten days, checkhere Wednesday reverled. Most severe damage was reported in

the extreme eastern and the upper sections of the county where hundreds of acres of timberlands have been arried over.
R. E. Staton, supervisor of projects

at CCC P-66, near Brevard, stated that total of 220 man days were put in during the past week by members of the CCC camp in fighting fires. This is equal to 10 men fighting continuously on ten hour shifts for 22 days. Mr. Staton said that it was impossible to estimate the amount of damage done by the numerous fires which his men have put out since Easter Sunday, but

Mr. Staton is of the opinion that a large part of the fires were started by of a box of candy to the senior who fire-bugs, and others through careless ness, with those started accidentally being in the small minority.

The penalty for setting out a fire is a \$200 fone or four months on the roads, or both, in the discretion of the court. Letting a fire get from control is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine

of \$50, or 30 days.

A slow falling rain Wednesday promised to aid the fighting of fires and to stop to some extent chance for others for several days.

## **NEW FARM SETUP** TO PAY FOR WORK **DONE DURING 1936**

Soil Conservation and Building Stressed In AAA Replacement Plan

Under the new farm program which displaced the National AAA which was in effect last year, farmers will be paid for doing things instead of leaving things undone, according to explanation of the plan here last Friday afternoon by Jack Criswell, extension economist of State College, Raleigh.

Every farmer in Transylvania county, regardless of the size of the farm, nay benefit under the new plan, and will be paid ten dollars or more in the fall if such farmers have compiled with the rules set up by the farm planning

There is absolutely nothing computsory in the new farm program, the representative of the state and federal farm boards stressed, but rather, it is a program that will pay farmers for doing as they please, so long as the work they do coincides with the soil consercation and soil building plans which shall be passed upon by a committee of Transylvania county farmers.

Worksheets will be ready within ten days, and will then be obtainable at the county agent's office in Brevard. In the meantime, while details of the worksheet (which must be filled out this oping) are being worked out, farmers of the various sections of the county may contact local committeemen for details of the plan. These committeemen are familiar with the various phases of the program, and will gladly go into the matter with any

Work of a constructive and valuable nature is being faught the children and young people of the community at the community recreation center on Oaklawn avenue, as revealed by a Dermid Charles Allen, Warren Alex-order, William Albert and Billy Nichol- Hamlin is supervisor in charge of this

project under the WPA setup.
A kindergarten for small children of pre-school age is conducted each movning from 9 to 12 o'clock, in charge of Mrs. John McLean. Twenty-five children are now enrolled, and a bright and happy group of boys and girls may be seen busily engaged in their work and play and singing of songs.

In an adjoining room, a group of cirls meets each morning, under the direction of their tercher, Mrs. Sam Mct'ullough, where they are taught the various stages of hand sewing from the simplest stitches to fancy embroiderary on useful household articles. Weaving the girls in this class. Another sewing class of young girls meets in the afternoons, under Mrs. McCullough's super-

vision.

Carpentry and designing in woodwork is another phase of the work taught young boys, under the instruction of Homer Corn. This class meets each afternoon after school hours, and the boys are learning to make really worthwhile household needs, plan and the boys are the control of the property o famey bird houses and to do repair work to discarded furniture.

One of the rooms in the house is bo-ing fitted up for meetings of the Girl Scouts, and much interest is manifested by the Scouts in getting the room in readiness for their use.
One night in the week is observed as

The house is open to clubs and organizations desirng a convenient place for meetings. Supervised play during school hours among the school children is another phase of the recreational project, which is in charge of Mrs. J. E. Lottis, Mrs. A. W. Cuff, and Mrs. Hamlin.

There are no funds allotted for equipment and furnishings of the community center in its various activities, these being provided through denations of individuals and organizations. The WPA provides only salaries for the workers d teachers. All class work and activities of the center are free to those desiring to avail themselves of this op-
