

## REPUBLICANS WILL MEET ON MAY 2ND AND SELECT TICKET

### Precinct Delegates Will Be Chosen Day Previous To Cast Ballots

Republican ticket will be selected at the bi-annual county convention which will be held here on the afternoon of May 2, according to official call which is being issued this week by Lewis P. Hamlin, chairman of the executive committee.

Delegates to the county convention which is to be held on Saturday, May 2, will be selected at precinct conventions which are to be held in the several precincts on Friday night, May 1, at eight o'clock.

Official call issued by Chairman Hamlin is as follows:

The county convention of the Republican party of Transylvania county, is hereby called to meet at the county court house, Brevard, North Carolina, at two-thirty o'clock, Saturday, May 2, 1936, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the various county offices, perfecting the county organization and transacting all business that may properly come before the convention.

Meetings of Republicans in the several precincts of the county are hereby called to be held at eight o'clock p. m., Friday, May 1, 1936, at the following places for the respective precincts: Brevard Nos. 1 and 2, court house; Brevard No. 3, Pisgah Forest school house; Boyd, Enon school house; Cedar Mountain, Cedar Mountain school house; Cathey's Creek, Selma school house; Dunns Rock, Connestee school house; Eastatoe, Rosman school house; East Fork, East Fork school house; Gloucester No. 1, Silverstein school house; Gloucester No. 2, Shoal Creek school house; Hogback No. 1, Quebec school house; Hogback No. 2, Lake Toxaway school house; Little River, Little River school house; Old Toxaway, Old Toxaway school house; Rosman, Rosman school house.

Precinct meetings will be called to order by the precinct chairmen or some member of the precinct executive committee. Each precinct will elect an executive committee one of whom shall be designated as chairman, and a secretary. They will also elect a vice-chairman who shall be a woman, one delegate and one alternate to the county convention for each fifty votes or fractional part thereof cast for the Republican Governor in 1932. The precinct chairmen are requested to bring the names and addresses of the several precinct committees as elected in their precinct meetings.

A full attendance of all Republicans in the several precinct meetings, and their attendance at the county convention on May 2, 1936, is requested.

## Jack Fishing Season Not Open Until June

It is a violation of the law to fish for jack or muskallunge in the French Broad river before June 10th, according to information received by The Transylvania Times from the State Department of Conservation and Development. The information was given in direct reply to a letter which was written to the department by The Times last week in order to clarify the question of when the jack season opens.

A news story carried in The Times of April 16, stated that the jack season opened at the same time the trout season did, which was April 15. This statement, however, seems to be incorrect, as the department specifically says that the season is closed until June 10th.

The department also states that fishing license are required to fish in the French Broad river, another idea that has been erroneously prevalent here.

General opinion has prevailed here that no license was necessary to fish in the French Broad, and likewise, fishing for jack was assumed to be o. k., at the same time the trout season opened. Both are incorrect.

## Bulbs and Seeds To Be Planted at B. C.

## ELECTION OFFICIALS NAMED AT MEETING

### Wilson Made Chairman; New Registration To Start On May Ninth

L. P. Wilson was elected chairman of the Transylvania county board of elections Saturday afternoon at the organization meeting of the board held in the court house, N. A. Miller and Judge D. L. English are other two members.

Miss Elizabeth Case will serve as stenographer in the office of the board of elections.

Registrars and judges were named for each of the 17 voting precincts of the county, and official notice given that the registration books will be open on May 9th for registering voters for the Democratic primary, and also for registration of Republicans, or Independent voters.

Republican judges to serve as precinct officials were named at the meeting of the board, the Republicans to serve in the primary in case there is a contest between Republicans who generally select their candidates in county convention. In case there are no Republican primary contests, the primary will be conducted by all Democratic officials, and judges were so named as alternates.

While the registration books will not be open until May 9th at the polling places, those people who wish to register before that date may do so by applying to the chairman of the board of elections in person. This rule applies only to those people who will be unable to be in the county during the registration period. Mr. Wilson states, but who wish to vote in the primary or retain their citizenship in this county. The regular registrars will not be able to take such oaths of registration prior to opening of the books on May 9th. Mr. Wilson also said,

It is necessary that any person who wishes to vote in the primary, (or who wishes to vote in the general election in the fall) appear in person and register, as a law was passed in the 1935 legislature calling for a new registration, and setting forth specifically that there should be no copying of names from old books, or registration other than by applying personally for registration.

## NEW FARM SETUP TO PAY FOR WORK DONE DURING 1936

### Soil Conservation and Building Stressed In AAA Replacement Plan

Under the new farm program which displaced the National AAA, which was in effect last year, farmers will be paid for doing things instead of leaving things undone, according to explanation of the plan here last Friday afternoon by Jack Criswell, extension economist of State College, Raleigh.

Every farmer in Transylvania county, regardless of the size of the farm, may benefit under the new plan, and will be paid ten dollars or more in the fall if such farmers have complied with the rules set up by the farm planning board of the state.

There is absolutely nothing compulsory in the new farm program, the representative of the state and federal farm boards stressed, but rather, it is a program that will pay farmers for doing as they please, so long as the work they do coincides with the soil conservation and soil building plans which shall be passed upon by a committee of Transylvania county farmers.

Worksheets will be ready within ten days, and will then be obtainable at the county agent's office in Brevard. In the meantime, while details of the worksheet (which must be filled out this spring) are being worked out, farmers of the various sections of the county may contact local committees for details of the plan. These committees are familiar with the various phases of the program, and will gladly go into the matter with any resident of the county.

## Recreation Project Is Doing Good Work

Work of a constructive and valuable nature is being taught the children and young people of the community at the community recreation center on Oaklawn avenue, as revealed by a recent visit to the center. Mrs. J. R. Hamlin is supervisor in charge of this project under the WPA setup.

A kindergarten for small children of pre-school age is conducted each morning from 9 to 12 o'clock, in charge of Mrs. John McLean. Twenty-five children are now enrolled, and a bright and happy group of boys and girls may be seen busily engaged in their work and play and singing of songs.

In an adjoining room, a group of girls meets each morning, under the direction of their teacher, Mrs. Sam McCallough, where they are taught the various stages of hand sewing from the simplest stitches to fancy embroidery on useful household articles. Weaving and other handicrafts are also taught the girls in this class. Another sewing class of young girls meets in the afternoon, under Mrs. McCullough's supervision.

Carpentry and designing in wood-work is another phase of the work taught young boys, under the instruction of Homer Corn. This class meets each afternoon after school hours, and the boys are learning to make really worthwhile household needs, plain and fancy bird houses and to do repair work to discarded furniture.

One of the rooms in the house is being fitted up for meetings of the Girl Scouts, and much interest is manifested by the Scouts in getting the room in readiness for their use.

One night in the week is observed as high school night, at which time the school boys and girls may meet for an enjoyable evening of supervised recreation at the center. The house is also open to clubs and organizations desiring a convenient place for meetings.

Supervised play during school hours among the school children is another phase of the recreational project, which is in charge of Mrs. J. E. Loftis, Mrs. A. W. Cuff, and Mrs. Hamlin.

There are no funds allotted for equipment and furnishings of the community center in its various activities, those being provided through donations of individuals and organizations. The WPA provides only salaries for the workers and teachers. All class work and activities of the center are free to those desiring to avail themselves of this opportunity for recreation, play and acquiring of valuable knowledge.
