## **NEW REGISTRATION NECESSARY BEFORE ELIGIBLE TO VOTE**

#### Books Will Open October 10 Election Office To Be **Open September 24**

Office of the board of elections will be openend in the court house on Thursday, September 24th, according to L. P. Wilson, chairman of the county board with Mr. Wilson and Miss Elizabeth Case in charge.

Registration books will be opened on October 10th. Mr. Wilson said, and remain open for three Saturdays at the various poiling places, The last Saturday in October will be challenge day, with the election coming on November 3rd.

New registration is called for in Transylvania county, and every voter who has not already registered during 1936 will have to register before being eligible to vote in the November election.

Those who registered before the primary will not have to register, but all other citizens are required to re-register. no matter how long they have been voting heretofore in this county.

Transylvania People Paid Nearly \$20,000 Sales Tax Past Year

Transylvania county people, merchants and business men sent nearly twenty thousand dollars to Raleigh as sales tax during the year ending July 1.

1936, according to figures from the revenue department.

Guilford county was largest sales tax payer, with \$777,317 for the year, fol-lowed by Mecklenburg with \$643,205,43. Transylvania's exact amount was \$19,-913.35.

Total amount collected by the state from the three per cent sales tax was \$10,184,301.57.
