Young People of Community Invited to Attend Revival Services

Vacation Bible school for young people will start at Brevard Baptist church Monday morning at 9 o'clock and continue for two weeks. Monday through Friday.

The Rev. Yancey Elliott paster, and a corps of 20 or more teachers will have charge of the classes which will meet each morning at 9 o'clock for threehour sessions, and all children of the community are invited by the pastors and church to attend.

Miss Catherine Lois Martin, of Southwest Baptist Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas, and the Rev. James Wilder, of Raleigh, together with a group of teachers and church leaders of Brevard, will have charge of the classes.

Young people of from 4 years of age through 16 are especially invited to the classes, and provisions are being made to adequately care for the 4-yearolds, as well as all departmental ages.

This series of services is for young people, the Rev. Mr. Elliott announces, with all young unmarried people urged to attend. Special services to which older people are to be invited will be announced later.

"We are trying to reach the young unmarried people of the community through this special series of services. Mr. Eillott said in announcing the services, "and while we expect the parents to take enough interest in the services to the extent of urging young people with whom they come in contact to attend, we do not think it advisable to have the older group in this special series of services."

Both the Rev. Mr. Wilder and Miss Martin are experienced in young peo-ple's work, the pastor said, and with the excellent corps of teachers which Bible school is looked forward to, as well as the special series of services in the evening for the young people.

Camp Illahee has been leased for the summer and will be operated as a camp for Jewish boys and girls, on a short camp term basis this summer.


