# Penalties Due On Town Taxes FOR THE YEAR 1938

After February 1, 1939, the following penalties will be added to the total amount of your 1938 taxes:

- Feb. 1—penalty of 1%
- March 1—penalty of 2%
- April 1—penalty of 3%
- May 1—penalty of 4%

June 1, and thereafter until paid a penalty of 1/2% will be added to the 4% already incurred. Please pay during January and save the added expenses.

The law also requires that the tax collector levy on personal property, and to garnishee wages after the first of February... this will be embarrassing to both of us.
