



Dr. Frazer is Professor of Political Science, University of North Carolina; president, Southern Political Science Association. He was educated at University of North Carolina, Johns Hopkins University and Institute of International Relations, Geneva, Switzerland. He was Carnegie Fellow in International Law at Geneva in 1931, and an observer at the World Conference on World Limitation of Armaments, Geneva, 1932. He is a recognized authority on international law, international organization and administration, and foreign affairs generally, especially librarian, Miss Annie Jean Gash. European affairs.
