### MARRIAGE BUSINESS SLUMPED DURING '39 New Year Fails To

Register of Deeds Issued Only 20 Licenses-Health Law . Is Cause

Marriage license business has fallen 75 percent during 12 months in Transylvania county, according to Register of Deeds Eck Sims.

In 1938 there were 80 marriage licenses issued in Transylvania, and only 20 during 1939, a drop-down of 60, or even 75 perceint.

The slow sale in this county is attributed to the new law passed by the 1939 legislature which requires a medical examination of both contracting parties before a license may be issued in the state, and majority of the people who feel that "two can live as cheap day afternoon. are no questions asked, and no doctors Tuesday afternoon.

The new health law requires that any couple marrying in South Carolina or other states, and returning to North Carolina to Lake their home, SHALL get the health prescribed certificate within & days, but there seems to be no teeth in that part of the law, so majority of the couples just go along and forget the whole thing.

A dozen or more applications were made to the local register of deeds during the holiday period, but the applican's didn't have the required medical certificates, and no sale was made.

Smoky Mountain Trailways bus, Bre vard to Asheville, will leave here at 7:30 in the morning, on and after January 8, instead of 6:40, as has been


