

The Jennings tract adjoins the large O'Connor boundary on which the local lumber concern is now working. When this boundary is cut out, operations will be immediately transferred to the Jennings



Mr. Sims was one of the first to volunteer for service in 1917, and his enlistment this week places him among the first veterans of In the first World War he enlisted in July, 1917, and was honorably discharged on March 28, 1919. He was a member of the 115th Field Artillery, 30th Division, and spent a total of 15 months in France.

His public record in Transylvania includes service four years as deputy sheriff, Brevard policeman, register of deeds for the county four years, and he was employed by the State Highway commission from 1928 to 1936, and again from 1940 to the time of his enlistment.
