Work of Fanatics

Rev. B. W. Thomason, pastor of the First Baptist church here, said he was of the opinion that the leaflets were being distributed by religious fanatics but that, if they were, it definitely tended to weaken the morale of the citizenry in the present total war effort. He said all religious groups ought to stand 100 per cent behind the government in the prosecution of this war and that there is no place at religious procedure as exemplified in the distribution to the public of such printed matter. The leaflet quoted various passages from the Bible to show that religion has no place in war.

Dr. Carl Hardin, mayor of Brevard, commenting upon the distribution here of the leaflets, warned citizens who might have any part in the distribution, under the impression that they are doing a religious work, not to be misled into WEST BREVARD doing the work of Axis agents or other fifth columnists.
