There will be no charge for the tankage if it is hauled away at once, Mr. Silversteen states. The tankage may be obtained either at Transylvania Tanning company, at Brevard, or at Toxaway Tanning company, at Rosman.



The shortage of tires and the reduction of gasoline sales still hasn't stopped traffic worries for Brevard Chief of Police B. H. Freeman and members of his force. Only this time it isn't automobiles and trucks.

Chief Freeman said Wednesday that cyclists are creating quite a traffic problem in Brevard by their disregard of traffic rules. He warned that after Thursday of this week bicycle riders will be fined if they ride under red lights or disobey any other traffic rules to which all motorists are subject. He also warned against riding on sidewalks, which is forbidden by city ordinance.

One other tip from the Chief: The penalty for stealing bicycles is the same as for stealing autos.
