

# SINIARD THINKS

Brevard Man Has Seen Good Deal Of Action On A U. S. Battleship

"In my opinion, this war will not be over for another two years at least," was the statement made to a Times representative yesterday by Gaston Siniard, chief ship fitter on a U. S. naval ship, who is here on a 10-day furlough with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hale Siniard. Mrs. Siniard is also visit-ing here with her husband.

Chief Siniard, who has been in the service of the U.S. navy for 14 years, displayed unusual modesty when questioned as to the meaning of the two bars of varied colors worn on his coat and the gold star on each bar. Further inquiry brought out the in-formation that one gold star was for his major engagement at Guadalcanal, and the other star for service before Pearl Harbor. He has been in the service in the Southwest Pacific the past five months, and has been on duty in both the Pacific and European theatres of war, with tremendous action encountered in both warring zones. Only a few details of his thrilling experiences could be obtained from Chief Siniard at this interview, which was ended only by promises from him to give more information for publication at another time during his visit here. He has been on one of Uncle Sam's major battleships.

Chief Siniard upon being back among homefolks again, and he thinks Brevard dooks attractive and peaceful after all the horrors of war he has experienced.
