#### Caution Is Issued Against Illegal Use Of Rationing Books

In order to avoid a continuation of an apparent epidemic of lost ration books, hereafter numbers and names of lost books will be published in this paper and merchants will be expected to check on the books, it has been announced by Dr. J. F. Zachary, chairman of the local ration board.

In the future, no ration book owner will be allowed a replacement on lost books within less than 60 days, Dr. Zachary said. He also called attention to the illegal use of ration books by other parties than the owners, and of the importance of owners keeping better track

of their books. Any one who finds a ration book belonging to another person is asked to turn such books over to the ration board or to the rightful owners. Around 100 ration books have been reported lost by various owners throughout the county, Dr. Zach-
