She attended Mars Hill College, Asheville College, and graduated from Maryville College, where she received her A.B. degree. She has also done work at Duke University graduate school. Mrs. Costner was formerly a teacher in Brunswick and Yancey counties.

Miss Harriett Wayne Gore, of Brevard and Conway, S. C., is the sponsor of the sophomore boys, and the teacher of history and general science. She graduated from Winthrop, where she received her A.B. degree.
Miss LaVerne Whitmire is the teacher of English. She is also the sponsor for the freshman girls. She graduated from Western Carolina Teachers College at Cullowhee, where she received her B.S. degree in English and history. Miss Whitmire has taught here since her graduation from college.

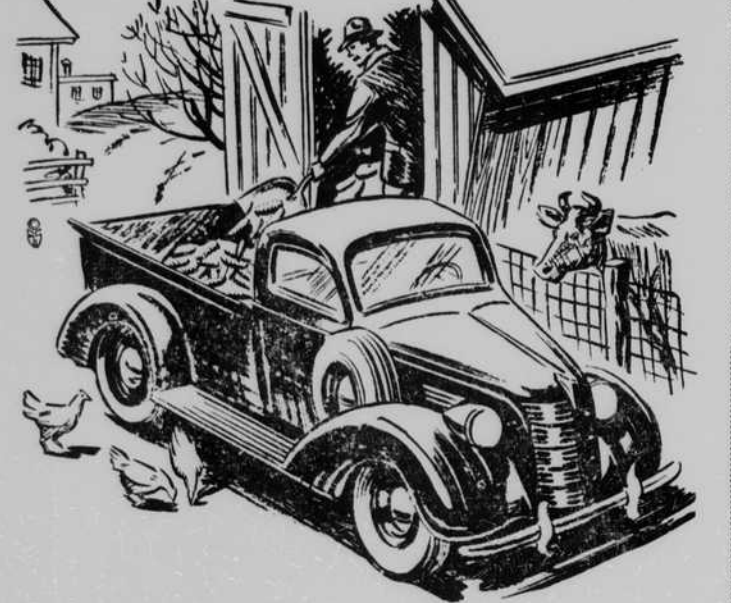
