

Visiting Puerto Rico Minister Praises Brevard As Ideal Vacationland

SPENT PAST TWO WEEKS VISITING HERE IN BREVARD

Town Recommended To Him By A Real Estate Dealer In Miami, Fla.

Brevard's magical charms are being sung far and wide, it was learned this week when Rev. Andrew I. Keener, a visitor here for the past two weeks, revealed to a Times interviewer that he first heard of this immediate mountain section through a real estate agent at Miami, Fla.

"If you want a vacation visit to a really beautiful mountain resort, you'll find nothing prettier or more climatically agreeable than a little town up in North Carolina, known as Brevard," the Miami real estate man replied to an inquiry of Mr. and Mrs. Keener as to a desirable mountain site to spend a couple of weeks' vacation.

Upon recommendation of the stranger, Mr. and Mrs. Keener came to Brevard and expressed such delight over their first visit here that they hope some time in the future to return and buy property with the intention of making Brevard their permanent home.

"I like everything about Brevard and vicinity," Mr. Keener said. "I like its people, the magnificent scenery, the orderliness of the town and the hospitality and friendliness so much in evidence, but the outstanding feature that pleases me most, I believe, is the beautiful trees that abound everywhere."

Minister in Puerto Rico

Rev. Mr. Keener and his wife were in Brevard for the past two weeks, en route from San Juan, Puerto Rico, where Mr. Keener has been pastor of the American Union church the past eleven years, to their former home in Pittsburgh, Pa., where he will again enter upon his pastoral duties as a Presbyterian minister.

Speaking of his experiences in Puerto Rico the past eleven years, Mr. Keener held of the thousands of U. S. soldiers who throng the island now, taking their final training for active combat duty on the

front battle lines in Africa, Europe and the South Pacific.

"These soldiers represent a cross section of American citizenry, coming from every part of the nation," Mr. Keener said. "They have a high character standard and their morale is excellent. When these highly trained men of our armed forces get through with those Japs and Germans there won't be much left of them (the enemy)," he further declared.

Mr. Keener said there were many things they liked about living in Puerto Rico, but after eleven years spent there without even coming back to the United States, they felt they were ready now to take up residence again in their native homeland and go back to their former home in Pittsburgh. He spoke of the constant warm climate on that island and said that the tem-

perature during the eleven years they lived there varied only 20 degrees—from 67 to 87.

Sub Menace Decreasing
The submarine menace has been very bad and has cut off much of the supplies that would have otherwise reached the island, but increased coastal patrol and other precautions have decreased this menace to a large degree, it was pointed out by Mr. Keener. He said that Puerto Rico gets nine-tenths of all its goods from the United States, and sells an equal amount to this country, but the island right now is undergoing a difficult period of shipping.

One application must be made for each group of persons who are related by blood, marriage, or adoption and who regularly live at the same address. Persons temporarily away from home (for a period of 60 days or less), such as students, travelers, hospital patients, etc., must be included in the application. Persons living at the same address but NOT RELATED by blood, marriage, or adoption must file SEPARATE applications. If additional applications are needed, you can get them at your post office.

A person may be included in only one application for War Ration Book No. 3.

The following may NOT apply or be included in any application for War Ration Book No. 3: Persons in the armed services, whether or not eating in organized messes, including Army, Navy, Marine, Coast Guard, and all Women's Auxiliaries; and inmates of institutions of involuntary commitment such as prisons and insane asylums.

Print below full name and complete mailing address of the person to whom books are to be mailed. Books will be delivered by July 21, 1943, to address given below. Books will not be forwarded. If you are not reasonably sure of address between June 15 and July 21, 1943, do not mail application. Such applications will be accepted later.

There is room for EIGHT MORE NAMES ON THE OTHER SIDE of the sample blank pictured here.

IF there are more than 18 related people living in one household, two application blanks must be filled out.

Every application MUST BE SIGNED by the person to whom the ration books are to be mailed or by their authorized agent.

IMPORTANT
Each application must be mailed with a 3-CENT STAMP unless applicants live in the city where the State Mailing Center is located. In that city, a 2-CENT STAMP must be used. The address of your mailing center is printed on the reverse side of all applications.
