# Transylvania Schools Open With Good Attendance

### **NEARLY 3,000** CHILDREN ARE **NOW IN SCHOOL**

Another Good Year Is Pre-dicted. To Start Publishing Schools News

**SCHOOLS OPEN 8:45** 

Brevard and Transylvania county public schools opened last Monday with good enrollments, Supt. J. B Jones announced yesterday.

Exact enrollment figures were not available from all schools in time for publication today, but it is believed that the total enrollment will slightly exceed last year's records, although a number of high school boys have already entered service.

Supt. Jones estimated that the county will have around 550 high school students this year and nearly 2,500 elementary pupils.

Enrollment at the Brevard high school is nearly 400 and at Brevard elementary, around 725.

Rosman high school has nearly 150 students and the elementary school around 475.

According to all indications, this will be another successful school year in Transylvania.
