# Brevard College To Open Next Monday For Tenth Year

### AN ENROLLMENT OF AROUND 250 IS ANTICIPATED

All Transylvania county students who are to enroll at Brevard college this fall are requested to register this Saturday morning between the hours of 9 and 12, Dr. E. J. Coltrane announced today.

Next Monday morning Brevard college will open for its tenth consecutive year, President Eugene Coltrane announces.

According to present indications, enrollment will be around 250, which is regarded as being exceptionally good in view of wartime conditions.


#### Two Egg Oddities Are Discovered Here
