ENROLLMENT TO REACH 300 MAR Brevard Junior College Is A Unique Institution

GIRLS OUTNUMBER BOYS 4 TO 1; 11 STATES INCLUDED

Large Number In Freshman Class. Around 30 Students Taking Pre-College Work.

Enrollment at Brevard college this year now totals around 260 and it is expected to reach 300. President Eugene J. Coltrane announces.

Boarding and day students for the fall semester today number 227 and 40 students were enrolled during the summer term. At least 40 more are expected during the rest of this fiscal school year.

Enrollment in the freshman class is approximately 150. In the sophomore class there are 46 students and in pre-college around 30. Students at the college this year

come from 11 different states, extending from New Jersey to Florida and Mississippi. A majority of the students, however, are from North Carolina. There are 15 from South Carolina.




