

APPEAL IS MADE FOR MORE SCRAP

Small Quantity Brought In Since Drive Was Resumed, Pipkin Reports.

Only a small quantity of scrap has been brought in since the Junior Commando scrap drive, sponsored by the local Junior chamber of commerce, was resumed two weeks ago, Paul Pipkin, who is in charge of the collection, said yesterday.

Mr. Pipkin said he felt sure that there was still a large amount of scrap available in the community and he urged youths to gather it up and bring it in. Scrap may be brought to the school house between 2 and 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Awards to indicate the amount of scrap brought in are still being made, Mr. Pipkin said. Youths may earn a sweater, cap, service stripe or plaque, he said, and he urged them to make an extra effort during the next two weeks, when the drive closes.

A huge amount of scrap was brought in by local children before the drive suspended last summer and the need for it is as acute now as it was then Mr. Pipkin said.

FROM PAGE ONE—Southern Shooting circle will be near the Ranger station on Davidson river. For the Northern area at the Forest service camp on Mills river. Pisgah Lodge hunters will check in at Stoney Fork as in past hunts. Guides will be available at the various checking stations for hunters who wish to employ them. Firearms permitted shall be non-automatic rifles of a caliber 250-3000 or .25-35 or larger, with the exception of .32-20. Also allowed are shotguns of 16 gauge or larger using single ball ammunition. This excludes the rifles of .25-20, and calibers smaller than .25 regard- less of shocking power. Ammunition will be restricted to hollow point or expanding point suitable for the rifles permitted. Fullpatch ammunition will be excluded.

The state dentist not only makes a dental inspection of each child who desires it, but he also makes corrections for as many underprivileged children as time permits and sends a postal card notice to the parents whose children need treatment. Dr. Dudley said that over 80 percent of the school children inspected in the county so far were in need of some form of correction. The average for the whole state is 85 percent, he pointed out. "Our children then are better off than those in many other counties and states," Dr. C. N. Sisk, health officer declared. "The main reason for the difference is that this county and state are meeting the problem through the Oral Hygiene division and the dental profession, with the broadest dental program in the country." "The results can be seen in the comparative figures, Dr. Dudley agreed and added, "but we still feel that we have barely scratched the surface." Dental clinics are to be continued most of this month.
