Rev. J. R. Owen, of Asheville, performed the ceremony before an altar banked with evergreens and leucothea and large floor baskets of white gladioli. Three seven-branched candelabra bearing lighted white tapers also were used, and the piano was decorated with evergreens and an arrangement of white snapdragons.

A program of wedding music was given by Mrs. J. R. Owen, pianist, and Mrs. Eva Israel Duckett, former college roommate of the bride. Mrs. Owen played "O Promise Me" and "Indian Love Call" prior to the ceremony, and Mrs. Duckett sang Schubert's "Ave Maria" and "I Love You Truly." "Libstraum" by Liszt was played during the ceremony and the traditional wedding marches were played for the processional and recessional.

Bride's Costume
