#### Republicans Pick **Ticket Composed Of Dewey And Bricker**

In a record time of less than two hours, the Republican national convention in Chicago Wednesday afternoon nominated Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, of New York, as the GOP candidate for president and Gov. John W. Bricker, of Ohio, as vice presi-

Gov. Bricker's nomination was unanimous following his withdrawal from the race for president. Dewey received all of the convention votes except one, which went for MacArthur.

The New York governor was expected to fly from Albany to Chicago and deliver an acceptance address Wednesday night at 10 o 'clock.

It was one of the most harmonious conventions the Republi-can party has ever held. Gov. Warren, of Calif., withdrew from the race for vice president.
