

BIG MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN TO BE LAUNCHED NOV. 1

Goal For County Is 100 Per Cent Of School Children. Services Are Listed

MISS LYDAY CHAIRMAN

An Enrollment for Service campaign of the Transylvania County Junior Red Cross will get underway next week in conducting a 2weeks membership drive, starting Nov. 1st and continuing through the 15th, according to an announcement by Miss Flora Lyday, Junior Red Cross chairman for this county. A goal of 100 per cent county membership is set for the drive, which is under the general sponsorship of the American Junior Red Cross.

The campaign is expected to enroll a membership of around 3,000 Transylvania county pupils, which was the 100 per cent goal attained in last year's drive. Nationally, the Junior Red Cross has more than 18,000,000 members, about 70 percent of the school population, making it the nation's largest youth organization.

The work is carried on through the schools of the county, with a junior Red Cross sponsor in each school, all working under the general supervision of the county chairman, Miss Lyday. An enrollment fee of 50 cents for each elementary grade room is required, bindership fee of \$1.00 for






