Farmers To Elect AAA Community Committeemen

TUESDAY IN COUNTY

Schedule Is Given. To Elect County AAA Committee Next Wednesday Here

DUTIES ARE EXPLAINED

Transylvania county farmers will elect their Agricultural Adjustment Agency community committeemen at meetings to be held next Monday and Tuesday and a county committee will be chosen at a meeting in the courthouse here next Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, T. J. Wilson, chairman of the county's AAA committee, announced today.

All farmers who have participated in the 1944 AAA program, such as carrying out approved soil-building practices, are eligible to vote in the elections.

There are 8 communities in the county and each community is to elect three committeemen and two alternates. Delegates to the county convention are to be chosen at the same time.

"Committeemen elected at this time will represent both their neighborhood farmers and the government in the work and responsibilities of the AAA," Mr. Wilson said. "Their recommendations, based upon personal knowledge and experience, help shape agricultural programs to meet local and national problems of farmers and consumers."


