

Six County Eating Houses Rated Grade "A"

SANITARIAN HART MAKES QUARTERLY INSPECTION HERE

Seven Restaurants Given "B" Rating. Meat Markets Also Inspected

Six restaurants in Brevard and Transylvania counties have received "A" ratings in the latest quarterly inspection, according to a release from Walter Hart, district sanitarian. Of these, Ecusta Cafeteria, of Pisgah Forest, holds the highest rating, with the Grill, Brevard Country Club, Pisgah Tavern, Galaway's cafe, and Varner's drug store also being classed as "A" grade.

The seven restaurants receiving "B" ratings are as follows: Macfie's drug store, the Chicken Kitchen, Long's drug store, Stroeller's inn, Gloucester Lumber company, of Rosman, and Whispering Pines cafe at Cashiers.

M. & M. cafe, of Rosman, Grady's place, the Canteen cafe, Oakland Avenue grill, and the Gulf cafe, were rated as "C" grade restaurants.

Market Ratings Given
Of the meat markets inspected, the A & P, Cash & Carry, Mitchem's Market, and Scott's Market, and the Carr Lumber company store, of Pisgah Forest, received "A" ratings. Patton's store at Pisgah Forest, Gloucester Lumber company, of Rosman, King's Market and the Dixie store were rated as grade "B" markets. The South Side Market was rated as grade "C".

Both the Billmore dairy and the Southern dairy here were awarded "A" dairy ratings. In the inspection of hotels, the Pierce-Moore and Franklin hotels were classed as grade "A". Tinsley's abattoir received a rating of "C".

Cleaning Furniture

If your summer porch furniture

is of willow, you might like to know that a strong solution of salt and water applied with a brush will clean it. It should be dried with a soft cloth. This method of cleaning also prevents the furniture from turning yellow.

Remove Hairs This Way
