POSTAL CLERKS TO GATHER HERE

All Schools In County Will Open On Monday

ENROLLMENT IS EXPECTED TO BE AROUND 3,000

To Hold Faculty Meeting Saturday Morning. Lunchrooms Will Open

BUILDINGS REPAIRED

A record number of approximately 3,000 students is expected to be enrolled in Transylvania county's 16 schools as the 1947-48 school year gets underway next Monday morning, September 1, according to J. B. Jones, county superintendent.

Last year slightly under 3,000 students were enrolled, and an increase of eight per cent is anticipated for the coming year. Announced elsewhere in this issue is a complete list of teachers for 1947-48, and Supt. Jones says the list is practically complete.

There will be a meeting of principals and teachers in the county on Saturday morning, August 30, in the Brevard high school auditorium beginning at 10:00 o'clock, it is reported. At that time explanation will be made of the new salary schedule, retirement laws and regulations regarding substitute teachers. Mrs. Cecil Hill, who was recently appointed fulltime attendance officer, will discuss school tendance officer, will discuss school attendance. N. C. E. A. election of officers and membership registrations will also be taken up.


