## WAS DESIGNED FOR 2,000 POPULATION HART TELLS CLUB

Suggests Having Larger Facilities For Growing Community

#### LOLLIS MAKES REPORT

In a discussion of the Public Health Department services in Transylvania county at the meeting of the local Kiwanis club last Friday night, Walter F. Hart, county sanitarian, strongly emphasized repairs and expansion to the present inadequate sewerage and water systems in the town of Brevard.

Mr. Hart, who has made detailed studies of the situation, pointed out that the present systems were designed for a population of 2,000 and the 5,000 persons who are now served by city water and sewage disposal are receiving neither adequate nor sanitary service. "Water cannot possibly be properly filtered under such circumstances," the county sanitarian said. "While water for Brevard is properly chlorinated, larger settling basins are needed and a larger water supply to adequately care for the growing community.

#### Have Open Disposals

In discussing the disposal of garbage, Mr. Hart pointed out that all restaurants in town have open disposal system that is at fault," he commented.
