

OVER 200 PERSONS Polio Drive In County Lacks ARE ADVISED OF \$600 Of Reaching Increased **NEED OF RECHECK**

Approximately 25 To 90% Of County's Population Already Examined

NOW GIVING TESTS

The follow-up chest X-Ray clinic to be conducted here next Wednesday and Thursday, February 25 and 26 by H. L. S. terwhite, technician from the State sanatorium, will include over 200 persons who have been notified by the health department that they need to be rechecked, according to Mrs. Jessie A. Lollis, R. N., public health nurse

Letters have been sent to these 200 persons stating that an ther X-Ray would be advisable, and they have made appointments to have this work done by Mr. Satter-white on Wednesday and Thurs-day of next week Mrs. Lollie sold Letters have been sent to th day of next week, Mrs. Lollis said.

"This does not mean that all or any of these 200 persons showed positive reactions, but only that the department deems it advisable for them to have a follow up examination," Mrs. Lollis reiterated.

List Compiled From Records The list of 200 suspects and questionable cases was compiled from the X-Ray records of the more than 5000 persons who received tests in the mass clinic held here last summer. The number of those X-Rayed was estimated to have been at least 85 to 90 per cent of the county's population over 15 years of age, and as soon as the clinics are concluded in the schools, this will mean that most of the population of the county has taken advantage of the chest X-Pay, according to Mrs. Lollis

ROSENWALD IS TO BE READY FOR OCCUPANCY MAY 1

Rapid Construction Reported **On New Brevard Ele**mentary Structure

ROSMAN NEEDS CITED

The school building expansion program in Transylvania county is moving at a rapid pace with the Rosenwald building nearing completion and construction on the local elementary school above the basement stage, Supt. J. B. Jones states today.

This has been achieved despite very unfavorable weather and with the approach of spring and more favorable conditions, Mr. Jones says that it is desirous that the advisory committee meet and approve plans for other projects in the program.

"Crowded conditions at Rosman elementary school have become critical, and in preparation for the meeting of the advisory council, sketches have been prepared, adding eight rooms to the present building and enlarging the substandard classrooms," the superintendent stated.

559 Elementary Students

"In calculating the number of square feet per child in one of the most crowded rooms at Rosman, it was found that a child has less than three times the space allocations hen in a standard chicken three." The declared. There are 559 elementary pupils enrolled and only eight classrooms in the building. This makes it necessary for four classes to meet in the high school building, causing inadequate space for high school students, it is reported.
