AVERAGE WEEKLY WAGE IN CCUNTY FIXED AT \$53.91

During Last Quarter of 1947 3,025 Workers Received \$2,120,764

During the final quarter of 1947 there were 3.025 workers employed n Transylvania county receiving total wages of \$2,120,764, according to figures compiled by the state unemployment compensation commission. The compilation show the average weekly wage during the period was \$53.91, a great deal above the state's average which is \$42.03. These figures are the high est in the history of North Caro lina and Transylvania county as well.

AN EDITORIAL -Be Sure To Vote Saturday!

The primary election will be held in Transylvania and other counties in North Carolina Saturday and we strongly urge every eligible citizen in the county to go to the polls and vote. True, we only nominate Saturday but from the nominees officers will be chosen in November.

It is the obligation of every citizen who is qualified to vote. However, it is stated that in the nation only one person in six votes, which reveals a deplorable apathy toward one of democracy's instruments for perpetuating itself.

We have slight patience with the person who criticizes the government and those who administer it, but who does not bother to use the franchise in an effort to correct the conditions of which he complains. Speaking by and large, it is probably true that we have as good government as we deserve and it is only through our intelligent discharge of the duties of citizenship that it will be improved. This much we believe is true: Such betterment will come from the bottom and not the top in response to the active and informed demand of the electorate.

All of us proudly proclaim ourselves believers in representative democracy. We deplore the fate of those nations which succumb to dictatorship and communistic forms of government. We have even given vast sums of money to sustain them against such regimes. To be consistent, therefore, we should neglect no part of our duty as citizens in a republic and the first of these, we believe, is to vote.
