

### AUTHORITY OF **INSPECTOR IS DEFINED IN ACT**

Chairman Of Board Says New Regulations Will Be Enforced To Letter

#### PENALTIES CITED

A revised electrical ordinance was adopted for Transylvania county by the county board of commissioners, which is designed for safeguarding life and property by regulating and providing for the inspection of electric wiring, devices, appliances and equipment and creating the office of electrical inspector and prescribing his authorities and duties.

Copies of the ordinance have been printed and are being distributed to interested persons by the commissioners and the county inspector, W. I. Reece, and the town inspector, E. L. Happ.

W. W. Brittain, chairman of the board, states that the ordinance will be carried out to the letter and that it was compiled with the suggestions of the electrical inspectors, J. M. Gaines, head of Duke Power company here, and in compliance with the state code.

As stated in the ordinance, no equipment shall be installed in buildings, structures or premises, nor shall any alterations be made to existing wiring, etc., without first securing a permit. Persons doing the work must also have an electrical contractor's license isgram. sued by the state board of examiners of electrical contractors.

Following the completion of SOFTBALL LEAGUE notify the electrical inspector, who will inspect the installation within 24 hours.

Electrical inspection fees were set forth in the ordinance, and persons violating any of the provisions of the ordinance are sub-
