A record number of fishermen and hundreds of sightseers are expected in Transylvania this week end with the opening of the trout fishing season both in Federal and public streams of the county. Due to the constant fire hazard the streams in the Pisgah have not opened in the past until early May, but this year the wildlife manage-

ment area streams are being opened simultaneously with the public ones.

Charlie Coffin, wildlife specialist in the Pisgah, urges the fishermen to check out by 8 p. m. Opening on Saturday are the following Pisgah areas: Davidson River, Bent Creek, Lake Powhatan, Up per South Mills River, North Mills River and the streams in the Sherwood Forest area.

Transylvania streams have been well stocked with rainbow and brown trout, according to Wade Bagwell, game protector here, who recently completed a two weeks' school at Chapel Hill. "The limit is 10 per day, and no game fish may be used for bait," Mr. Bagwell explains.

All fishermen using artificial lures are required to have a county or state fishing licenses, which may be obtained from local sporting goods dealers.

With Army engineers expected here in May to inspect the French Broad Valley with regard to flood control, members of the Transylvania flood control committee are making plans for meetings to be held here when they arrive.

Lewis Hamlin, chairman of the local group, was informed by Rep. Monroe Redden this week that the resolution recently adopted by the county committee is in full accord with his views on the subject.

"This is the program that I explained to the Army engineers and I feel that it will be of considerable benefit to the entire area," he stated.

The three primary points of the resolution are:

1. Adequate channel clearance. 2. The building of headwater dams so flood water may be contained in basins above fertile farm lands.

3. A combination program of drainage, flood control and soil conservation.




