Pisgah National Forest led both the Blue Ridge Parkway and the Great Smoky Mountain National park in popularity during 1950 and topped the ten favorite travel objectives with 1,922,775 visitors.

According to figures released today by the State News Bureau, there were five tourist objectives which passed the million mark. The Fisgah led the Parkway by over 1,000. Others in the order in which they came are Blue Ridge Parkway, Great Smokies, Nantahala National forest, state parks, Fontana Dam, Morehead planatarium, "Unto These Hills" at Cherokee, Hiwassee Dam and the "Lost Colony" at Manteo.

Although the local ranger district in the Pisgah has a large number of visitors, it is pointed out that this figure covers all ranger districts which are in western as well as coastal North Carolina.
