Canton Youth Drowned At Mouth Of Cove Creek On Davidson River



A 17-year-old Canton high school student, Jimmy York, was drowned Sunday at the mouth of Cove Creek on Davidson river, pictured above, in the Pisgah National Forest. The lad had been fishing with his father and brother and became separated from the group. A search was started that afternoon and the body was spotted Monday morning in the eightfoot pool of water, "X" marks the spot, by WAYNE WIGGINS, refuge manager of the Pisgah, who is pictured above pointing to the rock ledge on the other side, where the boy is believed to have slipped into the water.
