THESE ARE THE TEN outstanding young men of America of 1953, according to the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce: Maynard Malcolm Miller, 32, of Seattle, a geologist, scientist, explorer and writer, for his leadership in the field of geological science, including the organization and direction of the now famous Juneau Icefield Research Project. Frank Goad Clement, 33, Nashville, Governor of Tennessee, for leadership and contributions to the general welfare of the people. Walter Horace Carter, 32, Tabor City, N. C., newspaperman and publisher, for his Pulitzer Prize-winning public service in fighting the Ku Klux Klan. Albert Schatz, 33, Fairlawn, N. J., college professor and research worker, for his discovery of the wonder drug Streptomycin. Dr. Bernard J. Miller, 35, Laverock, Pa., surgeon and medical scientist, for unusual leadership in the field of medicine, including work in developing a mechanical heart and lung. Billie Sol Estes, 28, Pecos, Texas, farmer and real estate owner, for his unusual business accomplishments in agriculture and real estate. Douglas R. Stringfellow, 31, Ogden, Utah, U. S. Representative, for his espionage and sabotage work during World War II. Dr. Lloyd Thomas Koritz, 26, Rochelle, Ill., Doctor of Medicine, for risking his life to develop new techniques in artificial respiration. Sgt. Hiroshi Miyamura, 28, Gallup, N. M., winner of the Congressional Medal of Honor, for unusual bravery and devotion to duty as a soldier in the Korean War and as a prisoner of the Communists. Carl T. Rowan, 28, Minneapolis newspaper reporter, for unusual contributions to journalism, including articles and books on racial prejudice. The annual selection is restricted to men between the ages of 21 and 36. (Central Press)
