

Mr. Robinson, who spent seven weeks in Europe last autumn, will report on his observations after visiting Portugal, Spain, Italy, Germany, France, England and Scotland.

A native of Boston, Mass., Mr. Robinson and his family have lived in Charlotte for eight and a half Laurel Reported years. He became president and publisher of The Charlotte News in January of 1947 when the newspaper was sold to a company which Mr. Robinson organized.

Earlier in his newspaper career Mr. Robinson was associated for seven years with The New York Times where he worked in the circulation, news and advertising departments. After a period of public relations in the Panama Canal Zone and in New York City, he purchased in 1941 the Casa Grande Dispatch, a pioneer weekly in southern Arizona.





RALEIGH - The house passed a bill offered by Mrs. Ralph Fisher, which would fix the salary of \$3,600 for the clerk of court, register of deeds and tax collector and that of the sheriff at \$4,500. It also approved a bill, originating in the senate, which would fix the fees of the sheriff in Transylvania county.


