





> Enough vaccine is on hand to assure the children getting the first dosage of vaccine for the second shot as well. However, the booster shot recommended seven months later must be secured from private: physicians.

All of the doctors in Brevard are' now giving the vaccine and parentswho prefer may get the Salk vaccine from them.

Health officials point out that the important thing is to see that no child misses getting the Salk vaccine.
