

COSTS SAID \$205,000

After 12 years of planning and funds-raising, the congregation of the First Baptist church of Brevard will celebrate the completion of their new church edifice this Sunday morning, 11 a. m., with the pastor, Rev. B. W. Thomason, preaching on "Where There is No Vision, the People Perish."

In a spirit of Christian fellowship, the Brevard Methodist church has dismissed the Sunday morning service and will join in celebration with the Baptists. The Methodist pastor, Rev. Douglas Corriber, and Brevard college president, Rev. Robert H. Stamey, will assist Mr. Thomason with the service in the

All 850 seats in the sanctuary are expected to be filled Sunday morning, by the Baptists, Methodists and other well - wishing friends.

The church, which was built at cost of \$160,000, was begun in November, 1954 with the Liner Construction Co, of Lake Junaluska, coing the bunding. With the addition of the pews and new pipe organ, the cost of the church is \$205,000. The new pipe organ has not yet arrived, and an electronic Hummond organ will be used for the next two months.

The choir, under the direction of Mrs. H. E. Newland, new organist and choir director, will furnish special music for this occasion.
