

In County Set. Rabies Epidemic Is Widespread

The Transylvania County Humane Society is joining in a statewide campaign to rid North Carolina of rabies, and the first step is cooperaton in the annual innoculation of dogs that begins in February.

Rabies shots are required by law in the state with every owner of a Highlighting the annual Jaycee dog over four months asked to have

Dr. Verne Hill will have charge of the rabies clinics, assisted by the county dog warden and workers from the humane society.

Dogs which do not display the metal tags showing vaccination are required by law to be destroyed.

Members of the Humane Society point out that there is no cure for rabies after it is once contracted, but there is prevention. England, Australia, Denmark, and Sweden have eliminated this disease through vaccination and screening The local organization's Key Man of animals coming into these coun-


Prison Cook Feeds Guards, Then Flees
