Census In Community This Sunday **INCHES OF RAIN**

Dry Spell Of 40 Days Is End-ed. Mild Temperatures Also Noted In Feb.

RECORDED HERE

The first six days of February brought five and one-half inches of rainfall to Transylvania county, and prior to that time less than a quarter of an inch had been recorded in some 40 days.

The gentle, saturating type of rain was accompanied by mild temperature, with the mercury in the 30s at night and 40s and 50s during

Early Monday most of the creeks and streams of the county were filled to overflowing, but no flood conditions were reported in the

With February almost one third gone, there's hope that the month will exceed normal rainfall to insure a supply of moisture for the spring and to help off-set the midwinter drought.

Jack Huggins, weatherman in Brevard, reports the official rainfall in Brevard at 5.57 inches from Feb. 1 at 6 p. m., until Feb. 7th. Ecusta had 5.46 inches.
