A new college center building, the cost approximately \$300,000, was given final approval this week by the executive committee of the board of trustees of Brevard col-

Construction on the building, which will contain some 28,000 square feet, is expected to be started within the next 30 days, President Robert H. Stamey reports.

Plans and specifications are being completed by the architect, Henry McDonald, and the building will be erected by the J. A. Jones Construction company, of Char-

The beautiful new community center building will be located on the site where Old West hall stood, adjacent to the present Dunham
