

WILL ASK FOR **STATE FUNDS TO ERECT BUILDING** 

Now Renting Quarters And Sharing Program With Henderson County

#### SEEKING ASSISTANCE

The Transylvania board of commissioners are now investigating the possibility of erecting a Health Center building here, with the assistance of state funds.

Dr. John A. Ferrell, executive secretary of the North Carolina Medical Care Commission, has advised the commissioners that such a center would house the personnel and activities of a county health department.

"It is customary when the question of a health center for a county arises to learn from Dr. C. C. Applewhite, director of Local Health Division, of the budget and personnel of the health department of the county under consideration," he wrote. "I would suggest, therefore, as the first step that your commissioners contact Dr. Applewhite."

**MANY APPEARED AT MEETING OF** 

**Special Election Is Expected** To Be Called This Summer. Conditions Cited

**AMOUNT IS \$637,600** 

The Transylvania county board of commissioners Monday unanimously agreed to call a special election some time next summer to vote on the issuance of school bonds in the amount of \$637,600. Supt. J. B. Jones and members of the county board of education appeared before the board and requested the commissioners to call the bond election with the view of starting construction next fall on a new \$700,000 modern Brevard high school, and to carry forward a complete county school building program.

A number of other leading citizens also attended the meeting and urged the commissioners to take favorable action on the board of education resolution. These included Mayor John Ford, Attorney Tom Eller, L. F. Dixon and Milton Herzog, of Ecusta and representatives of the League of Women Voters. 

### **Time For Salk Boosters**, Must **Get From Doctor**

Officials of the Transylvania county health department have issued a reminder to parents that it is time for the third or booster dose of Salk polio vaccine, and that this vaccine will not come from the health office.

The booster shot should be given those children who received vaccine in April and September last year furnished through the Polio Foundation. No vaccine for the booster shot is furnished by the foundation and parents must arrange for it to be given their children by a private physician.

Parents of children who have not received any protection from poliomylitis are urged to make immediate plans for this as soon as possible with their private physician or with the health department. They advise there is not too much time before warm weather and the peak polio season.

Children from ages six months to 14 years are eligible for doses at the health department without charge. This applies, however, only to the first two shots.
